## Digital Divide in Texas

- According to the latest version of the [FCC's National Broadband Map](#), Texas has:
  - 10,096,058 total locations.
  - 167,807 unserved locations.
  - 77,230 underserved locations.

## House Bill 5 (87R)

- Created the Broadband Development Office (BDO) at the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts in 2021.
- Required the BDO to:
  - Create a state broadband plan (June 2022).
    - Updated Texas Digital Opportunity Plan ([TDOP](#)) published in 2023.
  - Create a [broadband development map](#) (January 2023).
  - Implement a broadband development program to administer broadband expansion grants.
  - Serve as a clearinghouse of information regarding broadband connectivity in the state.

## Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program

- [BEAD Program](#) application evaluation is underway.
- \$3.3 billion in federal funding to connect every eligible unserved and underserved location in Texas.
  - 245,035 BEAD-eligible locations in Texas.
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration's (NTIA) [BEAD Restructuring Policy Notice](#) changes include:
  - Technology neutrality.
  - Removal of non-statutory requirements.
  - Benefit of the Bargain Round.
  - Compressed schedule of events.

## Building the Texas Broadband Workforce Grant Program

- The Building the Texas Broadband Workforce Grant Program [NOFA](#) was posted on June 23 with a July 31 application deadline.
- The program provides \$25 million in grant funding to successful applicants to build or expand fiber optic training programs and grow a skilled and robust Texas broadband workforce.
- 19 applications received; BDO has begun evaluations.
  - \$60 million in funding requested across all applications.
  - \$3.9 million offered in match funding.
- Award announcements are expected in the fall.

## Texas Middle Mile (TMM) Program

- TMM Program goals:
  - Expand broadband availability
  - Strengthen network resiliency
  - Enhance affordability
- Additionally, the program incentivizes projects to include infrastructure enhancements that will directly support or integrate with flood detection and monitoring systems in vulnerable areas.

- Applications must be submitted through the [BDO Application Portal](#) by Nov. 20 at 2 p.m. CT.

## Technical Assistance Program (TAP)

- TAP was established to deliver no-cost broadband planning services to counties that lack the resources and capacity to undertake their own planning initiatives.
- Each participating county exits the program with a comprehensive county broadband plan.
  - \$6 million in CPF funding awarded to Cobb, Fendley & Associates (CF) to conduct the work.
  - All 32 counties that applied for the program were awarded.
- Planning work to date:
  - 6 published county broadband plans
  - 12 county broadband plans being finalized
  - 14 counties are beginning their work with CF.

## Bringing Online Opportunities to Texas (BOOT) Program

- The first round of [BOOT](#) was established as a competitive grant program to build last-mile broadband connections that increase high-speed internet service to Texans in eligible areas of the state.
- \$120 million in CPF funding made available.
- Impact
  - \$11.2 million was awarded to connect:
    - 1,468 residential locations.
    - 77 businesses.
    - 15 community anchor institutions

## BOOT II

- The second round of BOOT was a competitive grant program aimed at funding countywide infrastructure projects.
- Two counties in each of the Comptroller's 12 economic regions were selected on a demonstrated need, measured by the percentage of eligible locations lacking broadband service at speeds of 100/20 Mbps.
- Impact
  - The BDO was able to award projects in 21 of the 24 selected counties.
  - \$623.4 million in BIF and CPF funding was awarded to connect:
    - 61,185 residential locations.
    - 18,255 businesses.
    - 2,191 community anchor institutions.

## Expanding Regional Capacity Program

- The BDO and TARC have partnered to launch a new statewide initiative on digital access and opportunity entitled, the “Expanding Regional Capacity Program”.
- The program funds participating COGs to designate essential staff to implement activities and gauge broadband planning needs.
- Assessments of the state’s digital landscape revealed a critical need for expanded local capacity to address broadband and digital opportunity issues.
- The program is designed to empower COGs as local leaders in creating long-term and sustainable solutions for digital access.

## Expanding Regional Capacity Program: Scope

- All COGs are eligible for participation.
- The program seeks to leverage existing resources and knowledge to ensure efficient use of resources.
- This is a planning-focused initiative versus construction or infrastructure.

## Expanding Regional Capacity Program

Program Goals	Action
<b>Develop local expertise</b>	Fund and support planning commissions to hire a Regional Digital Access Specialist.
<b>Facilitate collaboration</b>	Convene stakeholders and partners to build strong regional networks.
<b>Create action plans</b>	Guide the development of comprehensive regional digital opportunity plans that align with statewide goals.
<b>Provide Resources</b>	Offer ongoing technical assistance and educational resources to support Regional Digital Access Specialists in their local efforts.

## Expanding Regional Capacity Program

Organization	Roles and Responsibilities
<b>COGs</b>	Leads on-the-groundwork, including community engagement, developing and implementing plans and strategies, and fostering local partnerships.
<b>TARC</b>	Serves as the program’s fiscal agent and administer the funds. They will oversee the day-to-day operations and provide essential support to COGs.
<b>BDO</b>	Provides the funding and overall guidance for success of the program, ensuring it remains aligned with the BDO’s statewide mission to bridge the digital divide.

## Expanding Regional Capacity Program

Expected Impact	
<b>Short-term</b>	Regions will have a dedicated leader (Regional Digital Access Specialist) and a clear, data-driven plan for their community.
<b>Medium-term</b>	An increase in coordinated, regional efforts to improve digital access and skills, moving from planning to action.
<b>Long-term</b>	This program will increase economic resilience and quality of life by ensuring all Texans can participate in and benefit from the digital world.

## Expanding Regional Capacity Program: Next Steps

- The program is in its initial phase.
- BDO and TARC are actively outlining the immediate next steps.
- TARC will soon launch the application process for COGs and finalize agreements with participants.
- BDO and TARC will provide regular updates as the program progresses.
