HOW TO PLAY

The rules are very similar to regular bingo, marking spots on your board for the item that is called out. In Lotería, the game boards are called "tabla" or "carta". You will need one "tabla" for each player and one deck of Lotería cards. One person, known as "el cantor" or the caller, will be announcing the cards.

- Each player has a different board, featuring pictures of the different cards in the deck
- The pattern to win is determined at the beginning of each round (Ex: Diagonal line, Vertical line, X pattern, Full card)
- A card is dealt from the deck and called out by "el cantor" or the caller
- Any player that has the picture of the card just announced on their board marks the spot
- Once a player makes the pattern for that game, they shout "Loteria" to declare their win. The first player to shout "Lotería" is the winner
- A new game is then started and the same process is followed until the Lotería game is over.

Keynote Speaker: Senator César J. Blanco. Senator César J. Blanco proudly represents the people of Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis and Presidio counties in the Texas Senate.

and Presidio counties in the Texas Senate.

César was raised in El Paso and after high school, he continued his family's tradition of military service in the U.S. Navy. He graduated from the University of Texas at El Paso and continued his public service by working for three Members of Congress representing El Paso and West Texas.

César was first elected in 2014 to the Texas House of Representatives. During his three terms he delivered for El Paso by leading initiatives to strengthen our workforce, economy, and border communities, improving the quality of life and increasing economic opportunities. He led efforts to protect education benefits and expand mental health resources for veterans, rein in rising prescription drug prices, and increase oversight

over border security. For his record, Texas Monthly named him one of the best legislators in Texas.

El Paso Historic Street Car

A small trolley cart was actually introduced to El Paso in 1902, replacing El Paso's mule car system, which had the town's pet "Mandy the Mule" taking passengers across the border and around the downtown area. As El Paso was growing in farming, manufacturing, mining, commerce, and the military, and needed an improved transportation system. Soon the streetcar was introduced to El Paso offering service to El Pasoans in the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s. Now our city patrons can ride these vintage El Paso original color-scheme streetcars, but with modern amenities such as air conditioning and Wi-Fi.


The project began with the construction of 4.8 miles of track, 27 stops, a maintenance and storage facility and associated infrastructure, along with the remanufacture of streetcars that used to serve El Paso. The streetcar vehicles, which are the same streetcars that ran on El Paso streets from the 1950s until 1974, were transported to Brookville Equipment Corporation in Pennsylvania for restoration on December 2015. Now, six streetcars are returned to service with each painted in one of the three historic color schemes used in El Paso from the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s.


